Healthy Range Abounding Life BY SHARIMEEKS, WY SRM EDITOR



Over 80% of public lands, in fact, are categorized as rangelands. The importance of healthy ecosystems is directly related to quality and sustainability of all life residing within Wyoming and beyond. In fact, our healthy ecosystems not only impact lands within Wyoming, but impacts adjoining states and countries through headwaters such as the Green River connecting into the Colorado River; the Snake River flowing into the Columbia, and more!

Its no secret that rangelands are an integral part of the heritage of Wyoming and are heavily utilized by a variety of users on both public and private lands. Range managers work with stakeholders to ensure sustainable management throughout the state so constituents can enjoy clean water and recreation as well as continue to provide quality wildlife habitat and plant diversity. As we work to understand what our rangelands can tell us through vegetation inventory and monitoring, we are then able to help land managers make sound decisions so all can enjoy the ecosystem services of our rangelands. I'd love to share a few reminders about the interconnectivity of all that healthy rangelands support.

Healthy Water Resources: Every drop of water that falls from the sky lands somewhere. In our local ecosystem the precipitation can land in the creek, lake or river; on a leaf, a rock, plant litter, or bare soil; or even on rooftops and pavement. In rangelands, we are primarily concerned with their ability to capture water and release it in a way that does not cause degradation. Healthy plant communities ensure that uplands are not contributing large amounts of sediment to water resources outside of what is expected. These water resources are used by everyone in Wyoming, for drinking, swimming, wildlife and livestock uses as well.

Healthy Wildlife Habitat: Wyoming is home to thousands of mule deer, Pronghorn antelope, moose, elk, among all other small mammals, insects and birds. Wyoming rangelands are an important habitat for resident animals and those that migrate to and from summer range. By managing our rangelands to be healthy, we not only ensure that wildlife have quality habitat, but we also ensure that the aesthetic and economic benefits are sustained.

Extraordinary Recreation: So many residents and visitors of Wyoming embrace our rangelands for the opportunity to hunt, fish, hike, take photographs, and to ride horses, dirtbikes, and four-wheelers, among so many other recreation opportunities. Doing these activities is likely not as pleasing in a denuded area. Healthy rangelands are important for users to enjoy the activities they are taking part in.


Healthy Range...continued

Abundant Diversity: One of the most unique and important attributes of health rangelands is their ability to donate diversity to the ecosystem. Wildflowers and rare plants abound in the desert early spring and in the high country mid-summer. Wyoming is home to over 20 different species of sagebrush, each having their own important role in the ecosystem. Healthy rangelands ensure that the seedbank is present, able to reproduce when conditions are ripe, and gives opportunity to all users to enjoy and thrive in this environment.

Abounding Life: Each attribute described contributes to abounding life on the landscape. Healthy rangelands ensure that all users benefit. Abounding life is the primary end result we strive for as range specialists throughout the globe!

We achieve this through a variety of projects on both public and private lands which helps gain a greater understanding of the cumulative health of an area or region. The depth and breadth of our work is vast as we work hard to ensure that rangelands are managed in a sustainable manner. We value all uses of rangelands and all constituents that utilize rangelands within our Wyoming boundary.

Stay wild, fellow range enthusiasts! Healthy rangelands are key to abounding life!







The Wyoming SRM Summer Range Tour was held in Sublette County August 11-12. The tour included a route to Green River Lakes with stops that focused on multiple use of rangelands. We heard from permittees Haley and France Clark and Albert Sommers on the history of their ranching operations and the challenges they face running livestock

with predators. We discussed cooperative monitoring, wildlife migration and feedgrounds, and recreation. And that was just the first day! On the second day, we shifted our focus to conservation on private ranchlands and looked at Zeedyk structures and beaver dam analogs as tools to help keep water on the landscape longer. We also looked at cheatgrass treatments and learned about the very extensive and successful cheatgrass program that Sublette County has. Overall, it was a great two days spent out on the range with great people. Along with folks from Wyoming we also had range professionals join us from Colorado, Nevada, and Utah. I want to give a huge thanks to our speakers Haley and France Clark, Albert Sommers, Gary Hayward, Jill Randall, Karen Clause, and Julie Kraft! Also I want to thank our lunch sponsors Y2 Consultants and Bayer! The tour was so much fun and we hope we can continue this SRM tradition annually! WYRED 2022

Wyoming Resources Education Days, WyRED, connects youth and adults to the land through a 4 day, hands-on, field camp to build a knowledge base, skill set and appreciation for the management of Wyoming's natural resources. WyRED rotates throughout the state and was held at the H Diamond W Youth Camp near Grass Creek June 13-16, 2022. Campers learned about plant identification,



soils, grazing, resource planning and management decisions. We had a great lineup of natural resource managers who involved students in their career field including WGFD, USFS and LU Ranch.

Campers also prepare for the Range Contest. Glenrock 4-H won the contest with members, Anna, Cora and Kayla Grant. The Andrew family from Burlington won second place with members Raygen, Rulon and Raiden. Campers also received individual awards: Anna Grant – Top Wrangler, Top Returning Camper; Kayla Grant – Top New Camper; Raygen Andrew – Top Range Rider; Raiden Andrew – Top Brush Popper; Rulon Andrew – Most Improved Camper. Adults competed in the contest and Daniel Holter won the Adult division. At the end of the week, we celebrated the longtime service and dedication of Marji Patz who was the WyRED chairperson for 17 years. 
